behalf of all of Navy Medicine, I extend my sincerest and most heartfelt congratulations to our Medical Corps as you celebrate your 151st birthday. Since formalized as an official staff corps on March 3, 1871, the Medical Corps has continued to adapt and develop with the times. An excellent example of such adaptability is seen by the evolution of our flight surgeon community.

Nearly a hundred years ago - on April 29, 1922 - the Navy's first class of flight surgeons graduated from the Army's School of Aviation Medicine in Mitchell Field, NY. Among them was LT Victor Armstrong, the first Chief of the Aviation Medicine Division at the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. It is no understatement to say Armstrong and his fellow pioneering Navy flight surgeons founded the very field of naval Aviation Medicine. Under their watch, the first flight surgeons reported aboard carriers Langley, Lexington and Saratoga; an aviation medical research program was developed; a separate school for training Navy flight surgeons was established; and most significantly, our Navy and Marine aviators were able to attain a new level of care and readiness never before seen. In World War II, Navy flight surgeons were found on carriers and at forward operating air stations across the Pacific, and it is perhaps no surprise they were among the most highly decorated wartime physicians.

The same dedication and focus to duty so exemplified by our founding flights surgeons can be seen throughout the Medical Corps today. As part of Operation Allies Welcome, Navy medical physicians helped oversee the medical

screenings and acute care for some 100,000 Afghan partners. Medical Corps officers continue to provide lifesaving care at civilian hospitals and clinics from Albuquerque, NM to Takoma Park, MD as part of our Defense Support to Civilian Authorities COVID-19 teams. And each day - whether on ship or shore - the members of our Medical Corps are providing patient care, mental health services, medical education and training, public health services, conducting biomedical research and serving as leaders and mentors throughout the Navy. In short, they are Projecting Medical Power for Naval Superiority!

To the 4,200+ Active Duty and Reserve Medical Corps Officers, I thank you for your selfless service, your professionalism, and the sacrifice of you and your families make each and every day.

I am proud to be your shipmate and it is my honor to serve with you as part of One Navy Medicine.
