

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PHASE III NMRC POLICY

On 23 June 2022, BUMED Acting Chief G.D. Shaffer signed BUMEDMEMO 6000 "Naval Medical Readiness Criteria", aligning medical force readiness enhancement through the Naval Medical Readiness Criteria (NMRC). This memo achieves the following:

- Outlines the NMRC requirements for an additional 32 non-combat casualty care team specialties and enlisted classifications (bringing the total to 117 NMRC, covering approximately 140 occupational codes)

 - ₱ 7 Medical Corps Specialties ₱ 4 Nurse Corps Specialties
- Gives instruction on monitoring and executing the NMRC on a monthly basis
- Implements a medical readiness assessment process for wartime medical skills

The NMFDC is working separately with Reserve Component (RC) Specialty Leaders (SLs), Enlisted Technical Leaders (ETLs), and Reserve Affairs Officers (RAOs) to incorporate RC feedback into the NMRC.

NMRC REVALIDATION PROCESS

This cyclical revalidation process (illustrated below) is designed to incorporate lessons learned and input from NMRC owners to ensure that requirements stay relevant and actionable to assess true readiness proficiency.

NMFDC incorporates outstanding feedback, adds a policy origin for requirements, and checks requirements for accuracy/consistency before requesting feedback for review.



2. Request Feedback

Active and Reserve leadership for each Corps request SLs/ETLs review NMRC for accuracy and completion and remove any items that are not true "red-line" requirements to deploy.

The process repeats for each 3. Receive Feedback

Reserve and Active SLs/ETLs coordinate to review NMRC and provide consolidated feedback to the NMFDC inbox via the provided NMRC Feedback Form (also found on Max.gov).

NMFDC sends the updated NMRC to RAOs and Corps Chiefs representatives for awareness/concurrence.

4. Incorporate Feedback

NMFDC incorporates feedback into the NMRC as it is received. If needed, the NMFDC team reaches out to SLs/ETLs to clarify any questions.

The NMRC are living documents and can be updated at any time to reflect evolving mission requirements.
